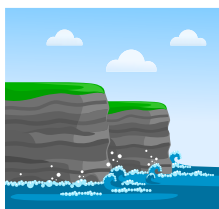

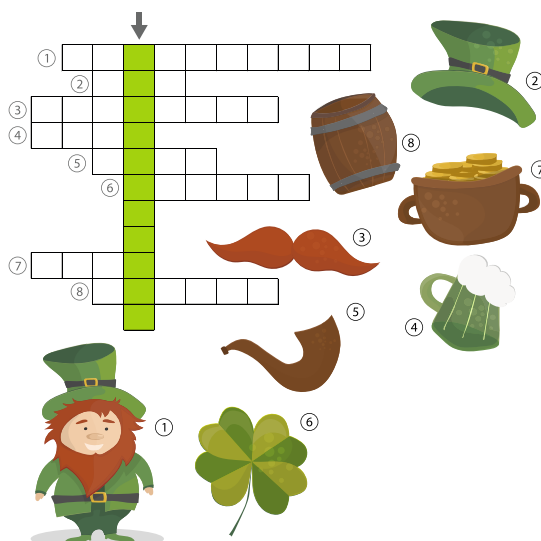

He liked to climb trees, pick apples, and play with his dog.

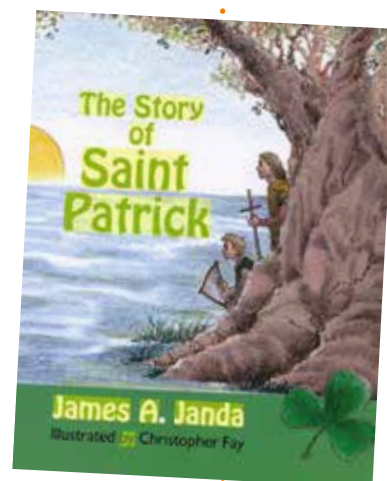
Patrick had a happy time until he turned sixteen.
